1 Accounting policies

a) Accounting convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

b) Income

Donations, grants and bank interest are accounted for on a receipts basis.

c) Publications

Commercial sales of publications are included in the income and expenditure account net of the related production costs.

d) Depreciation

Fixed assets are shown at cost and are depreciated on a straight line basis over five years with a full years' depreciation being charged in the year of purchase and no charge in the year of sale.

e) Stock

Stock is carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value.
