Chair's Statement – Tuarastyl y Chaairliagh

For the year ended 31 March 2023

This is my seventh statement in the annual report and financial statements of Culture Vannin.

This year, we celebrated the 40th anniversary of our founding legislation, the Manx Heritage Foundation Act, a milestone in our journey to support and promote the intangible culture and cultural heritage of our Island. We have always benefitted from many hours of voluntary support given to the charity by our board members over that time, and we were particularly delighted to gather them together to reflect on their incredible contribution. We showcased the Manx music, language and dance communities' creativity at a concert at Cathedral Isle of Man, which featured commissioned works, as well as those we had worked with as recording artists and competition winners over the decades. IOM Post Office generously offered a 40th anniversary issue of stamps designed by the talented Jay Cover, which encapsulated the forward momentum of our organisation, carrying our culture and traditions to the next generation. Our '40 Manx things' challenge was enjoyed by many, and encouraged all ages to discover Manx culture for free, and our monthly column for IOM Newspapers told the stories of those who have made a difference to our understanding of Manx culture. We also recorded more oral history interviews, a process we will continue, so that future generations can hear directly from those involved in so many interesting parts of Manx life. The extra 40th anniversary grants totalling £40,000, which appeared in last year's annual financial statements, started to be delivered during this financial year, and have already proved an important way of recognising and celebrating the work of the cultural community.

One aspect that I would like to highlight this year is the international reach of Manx culture. The culture of the Isle of Man and its people is not only important to our communities and to the UNESCO Biosphere Isle of Man status, but also to millions of people worldwide. Culture Vannin supports media enquiries on a range of subjects, provides support for researchers, and teaches people through live lessons and online recorded tutorials. International support for Manx culture lies not only within the Manx diaspora, but also within communities who are interested in the Isle of Man or minoritised cultures more generally.

The Breton-Manx collaboration, first commissioned by Culture Vannin, established itself as Neear Nesañ and produced a debut album which was toured internationally. We hosted a visiting sociolinguistics class from the University of Bern, giving talks and lessons to support their work on Manx English. The Manx language received a great deal of international attention in the media, triggered in particular by a lengthy feature in the *New York Times*, which had a staggering reach of over 220 million worldwide. Articles and features for the *Irish Times*, *The Guardian*, BBC Cymru, France 24 TV, RAI TV in Italy, CBS News (USA) followed. We continued our teaching in person and online, reaching learners and speakers in Singapore, Georgia, New Zealand and North America, as well as throughout the Isle of Man.

Manx culture is something that has a multi- and inter-generational appeal; it brings people together of all ages, too. We are particularly proud of our youth work for music through Bree, Scran, and the Manx Folk Awards, which invite participation from all of the Island's schools and involve over 1,000 students. We love working with adults, too, from our Manx lessons to social media and events. We take time to coordinate and collaborate with other agencies to maximise opportunities for Manx culture wherever possible – this sense of cooperation with the community is at the heart of successful cultural development work.

This year, we passed the milestone of 1,000 films on YouTube which have received almost 4 million views. We also took part in inter-Gaelic webinars on Hop tu Naa and Halloween for An Comunn Gàidhealach Americaganach (American Scottish Gaelic Society), as well as delivering talks on Island in collaboration with various heritage organisations and trusts.

Our involvement with multi-agency activities includes the Manx Language Network, which launched its second Manx Language Strategy in June. We are pleased to be working with others to shape and support a bright future for the language, in support of the European Charter for Regional or Minority Languages, to which the Isle of Man is signed up. Excellent work within the Island's schools is complemented by the work of voluntary organisations, and new initiatives such as the Manx Language Research Group and the development of the online, searchable Manx corpus.

Tynwald Members were recognised for their efforts in using Manx this year, with Joney Faragher MHK receiving the Londeyr award at the Cooish festival. We have been impressed by the work of the Lieutenant Governor, His Excellency Lieutenant General Sir John Lorimer KCB DSO MBE, to take the Manx language into new spaces on Tynwald Day and other official occasions. We are keen to make Manx culture accessible to everyone, from official occasions to informal events, from faith leaders and folklorists to children in our schools and around the world. The Gaelic Broadcasting Committee became a fully-fledged sub-committee of Culture Vannin during the year, too, and we look forward to a renewed sense of planning and future-focus.

We have been delighted to welcome a new Hon Treasurer and part-time Finance Officer, whose contributions have already been felt. The year has also seen changes in our representatives from Manx National Heritage and IOM Arts Council. We thank Dr Catriona Mackie and Jade Boylan for their valuable contributions, and welcome Joan Conway and Dr Laura Rowles. Board and officers have spent time this year focusing on strategy, something that is important as we think about the future direction for the organisation.

Special thanks must go to Board Member, Professor Angela Little, for her work on '150 Years of Education for all', celebrating the 150th anniversary of the 1872 Isle of Man Act for Public Elementary Education. Working with the Department of Education, Sport and Children, we helped to produce a commemorative booklet, and we provided online resources for this landmark act.

Our *bona vacantia* projects with Isle of Man Arts Council came to a conclusion with the delivery of the Conrhenny Shelter in celebration of UNESCO Biosphere Isle of Man. Kemmyrk Choan Rhennee can be found within Conrhenny Community Woodland, and provides a space to connect with the biodiversity around us whilst celebrating the value of arts and culture within the natural environment. This collaborative project involved designers, architects, joiners, as well as Biosphere Isle of Man and the Department of Environment, Food and Agriculture, and embodied the spirit of the Biosphere message: 'Working together for a sustainable future'.

This year, we have been more conscious than ever of our roots in our founding legislation, and the grassroots desire to shine a brighter light on Manx culture and cultural heritage, a desire which started with a petition to Tynwald, and which resulted in the formation of our charity. As ever, we are grateful to be but one voice among thousands throughout the Island and around the world who will shout about the extraordinary success and resilience of Manx culture, something that speaks volumes about the Isle of Man itself.

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Treasurer's statement – Tuarastyl y Tashteyder *For the year ended 31 March 2023*

This year the charity received its Isle of Man Government Treasury grant of £100,000 and saw lottery duty income again increase to £412,129 (2022-£399,447), which is in excess of the estimate in the Pink Book. The lottery duty and Government grant income are unrestricted, and are used to pay staff costs, office overheads, fund the charity's development activities, as well as grant distributions.

The largest operational expense is staff costs, which has fallen slightly by 1%. This is in part due to 2022 including provision for the handover of the Honorary Treasurer position and revised staff hours. Staff costs include development officers as well as support staff, who work to maximise effective delivery of the remit of the charity. A pay award made during the year was in line with the Isle of Man civil service agreements (Public Services Commission), which the Members of the Foundation elect to follow.

The charity carries out its objectives in a number of ways, most significantly by the development work undertaken by the employed staff, and also by the distribution of grants. We were pleased to see existing and new activities gradually returning to greater strength post lockdown. We do, however, recognise the pressures on volunteer committees for events and festivals, and have offered Covid-recovery payments where appropriate in order to build confidence for long-established festivals in particular. We have also been delighted to see many of the awards made to celebrate the charity's 40^{th} anniversary come to fruition and we hope many of you will enjoy them when they are made available, online and otherwise. This year the Board has again received 45 grant applications, which has resulted in £59,279 in grants being given to 31 applicants. These grants were funded from General funds for the year. In addition, £1,059 was made available for the first of the Sophia Morrison awards from the Frost Bequest, recognising excellence in the Manx language at the TCG (GCSE) level. The Board has also agreed that £15,862 will be added to the Grants reserve to enable them to consider granting awards in the future when grant income may not be sufficient, or available, especially in the case of exceptional grant applications.

The total net income of the charity for the year is £54,344 (2022: £68,163), but it should be highlighted that in 2022 there was a net gain in restricted funds of £100,000 as a result of the large donation, the Frost Bequest. The 'normal' activities of the charity resulted in a surplus of £54,344 (2022: deficit £4,714) which the Board has allocated to designated reserves. This surplus has been created in part due increased interest rates. During the year and in line with our founding legislation, the Board agreed to approach Treasury for approval for monies to be held in term deposit accounts, which was granted. As well as the £15,862 allocated to Grants Reserve, and being mindful of increasing costs and the desire to make the building more sustainable in the future, £35,041 has been added to the Sustainable Building and Conservation Reserve, having now costed and scheduled surveys. £10,500 has also be added to the Contingency Reserve which will allow the Foundation to continue in the event that a significant income stream ends. This will maintain the reserve at ten months of staff and operational costs, which is considered good practice. In May 2021 it was agreed that this reserve should be increased from 6 to 12 months of staff costs and overheads. This increase will be implemented gradually, as funding permits. Total reserves at 31 March 2023 totalled £1,053,148 (2022-£1,021,928). It should be noted that the Kaneen Legacy designated funds represent the value of Fairfield House, which houses the cultural centre and offices, and which is also used for evening and weekend classes and activities.

Culture Vannin is expected to continue receiving the same funding and support, and is therefore forecasting and budgeting to cover its normal operational costs from annual income. Members have approved these financial statements in the confidence that the reserves are adequate and prudent to support the future of the charity so that it can continue to fulfil its charitable objectives in the community.

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Objects of the charity – Kiarailyn y çheshaght ghiastyllagh

Under its trading name of Culture Vannin, the Manx Heritage Foundation works to fulfil the objects detailed in the Manx Heritage Foundation Act 1982 (MHF Act 1982):

- to promote and assist in the permanent preservation of the cultural heritage of the Island, and in particular to provide facilities for members of the public to enjoy and acquire knowledge of that heritage
- to establish and maintain at St. John's in the Sheading of Glenfaba in the premises referred to in section 6 a centre for the promotion, and encouragement of an active interest in, and the study of, the Island's cultural heritage by its people
- to arrange and provide for or to join in arranging and providing for the holding of exhibitions, meetings, lectures and classes and the printing and publishing of any reports, pamphlets, periodicals, books or other documents in furtherance of these objects
- to administer the Fund in accordance with this Act
- to do such other acts or things as are incidental to the attainment of the objects of the Foundation, and so far as it may be necessary or desirable, to do such acts or things in collaboration with any person, body, institution, authority or otherwise
- to charge such fees for the Foundation's services as the members of the Foundation may consider reasonable.

The Act lists cultural heritage as including:

There was no change to the Charity's name or Governing Instrument during the accounting period. No Member of the Foundation was employed during the accounting period. The Director (employed officer) is the charity secretary, and the Hon Treasurer receives an honorarium, but neither is a Member of the Foundation and neither has a vote. Members are appointed as per Section 1 (2) of the MHF Act 1982.

Aims and objectives set for the charity in the future – deanyn son y traa ry-heet

The Foundation works strategically to fulfil aims and objectives for the future development of Manx culture and cultural heritage. Members have developed an internal strategy which focusses on the subject areas listed above through communication, community, activity, creativity and innovation, education, funding, partnership, recording and research. The Manx Heritage Foundation trading as Culture Vannin is joint author of the National Development Strategy for Culture and the Arts (2017-2027), the action plan for which focuses on five ambitions:

- 1. Inspire people of all ages and backgrounds to enjoy culture and the arts.
- 2. Invest in the Island's creative and cultural communities so that they are successful and sustainable.
- 3. Promote our unique Manx culture and distinctiveness as central to the Island's image, nationally and internationally.
- 4. Champion the arts and culture as fundamental to our wellbeing and sense of place.
- 5. Inspire and enable people to explore new horizons through innovation, media and technology.

The second joint Manx Language Strategy 'Gaelg son dy chooilley pheiagh' (2022-2032) is another important commitment and focus. The ten-year living action plan for this is guided by Jeebin, the Manx Language Network, of which Culture Vannin is a founding member.

The charity is working to refine the communication of its core values, accessibility and equality.

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Statement of Members' Responsibilities in Respect of the Members' Report and the Financial Statements

For the year ended 31 March 2023

The Members are responsible for preparing the Members' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law.

- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP.

The Members are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the foundation's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the foundation and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Manx Heritage Foundation Act 1982, Charities Registration and Regulation Act 2019, and the Charities Regulations 2020. They are responsible for such internal control as they determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the foundation and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Manx Heritage Foundation (the 'Foundation') for the year ended 31 March 2023, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, Balance sheet, Statement of Movement on Reserves and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102; The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) as modified by the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2018 made under the Audit Act 2006.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the state of the Foundation's affairs as at 31 March 2023 and of its net movement of funds for the year then ended;
- have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Isle of Man Charities Registration and Regulation Act 2019, Charities Regulations 2020, Accounts and Audit Regulations 2018 made under the Audit Act 2006 and the Manx Heritage Foundation Act 1982.

Basis for opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK) (ISAs (UK)) and applicable law. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements section of our report. We are independent of the Foundation in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements, including the FRC's Ethical Standard, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Conclusions relating to going concern

In auditing the financial statements, we have concluded that the members' use of the going concern basis of accounting in the preparation of the financial statements is appropriate.

Based on the work we have performed, we have not identified any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that, individually or collectively, may cast significant doubt on the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern for a period of at least twelve months from when the financial statements are authorised for issue.

Our responsibilities and the responsibilities of the members with respect to going concern are described in the relevant sections of this report.

The members are responsible for the other information. Explanation as to what extent the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud

Notes

1 Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) Section 1A (as applicable to the Foundation) and the Charities Registration and Regulation Act 2019.

The Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

The Registered address is Fairfield House, Main Road, St John's, Isle of Man, IM4 3NA.

The functional and presentational currency is GBP and rounded to the nearest GBP.

b) Fund Structure

The funds of the Foundation are maintained within The Manx Heritage Foundation Fund, in accordance with the requirements of the Manx Heritage Foundation Act 1982.

The non-designated fund represents an unrestricted income fund, from which Members are free to use for expenditure, loans or grants in furtherance of the charitable objects. Unrestricted funds include designated funds where the members, at their discretion, have created a fund for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are funds donated for a specific purpose. The Frost Bequest is a restricted fund, the terms of which are explained fully in note 4.

Designated funds include:-

i) Kaneen Legacy

A designated fund was established following receipt of a generous legacy from the late Professor Brian Kaneen (see also note 3). The resources were designated for use in developing a Cultural Centre, which supports the intention of Professor Kaneen that this legacy be utilised for the development of the Manx language. The legacy also provides for an annual bursary, eligible to fluent Manx speakers under the age of 30, to study in Ireland in accordance with the wishes of the late Professor Kaneen.

ii) Contingency Reserve

A Contingency reserve was established to allow the Foundation to continue if a significant source of income ends. This would enable the Foundation to continue in operation and generate alternative sources of income, or to wind down the charity in a planned and organised way. The policy will be reviewed annually to ensure it is still appropriate, necessary, and relevant. Each year the reserve requirement will be assessed, and the balance adjusted with a transfer from non-designated funds.

It was agreed in May 2021 that this reserve will be increased to the equivalent of twelve months' budgeted staff and operational expenditure when this is possible. The reserve currently stands at ten months.

b) Fund Structure (continued)

iii) Sustainable Building and Conservation reserve

The sustainable building and conservation reserve was created for the purpose of maintaining and repairing the Culture Centre in St Johns. Each year the adequacy of the reserve will be assessed to ensure it is sufficient to cover future maintenance and development costs of the building, and a transfer of funds from non-designated funds will be agreed.

iv) Grants Reserve

A Grants reserve was established and is to be funded with an amount each year from available income which has not been spent on awards or other charitable activities. The accumulated reserve will be available for distribution by way of grants or other financial awards, following the same criteria and approval process as any grants or other financial awards made from income. The purpose of the reserve is to enable awards to be considered and granted when current year income may not be available or sufficient, especially in the case of exceptional grant applications.

c) Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the Foundation has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the Foundation is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Foundation that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably, and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the Foundation, or the Foundation is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

Income received in advance for a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

Income earnt but not received is recognised as accrued.

d) Resources expended

Liabilities recognised as resources are expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Foundation to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

In accordance with the Manx Heritage Foundation Act, provisions for grants are made when the intention to make a grant has been communicated to the recipient but there is uncertainty about the timing of the grant or the amount of the grant payable. Any grant not claimed within two years of the date of its award is cancelled.

Grants payable are payments made to third parties in the furtherance of the charitable objects of the Trust. Single or multi-year grants are accounted for when either the recipient has a reasonable expectation that they will receive a grant and the Members have agreed to pay the grant without condition, or the recipient has a reasonable expectation that they will receive a grant and any condition attaching to the grant is outside of the control of the Foundation.

e) Publications

Commercial sales of publications are measured at fair value of consideration received and represents invoiced sales and are included in the statement of financial activities account (note 5).

f) Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment. Fixed assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the following periods:

(i)	Computer equipment	3 years
(ii)	Other assets	5 years
(iii)	Property	50 years
(iv)	Property refurbishment	10 years
(v)	Exhibition development	10 years

An impairment review will be carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of a fixed asset may not be recoverable.

g) Stock

Stock is carried at the lower of cost and net realisable value on a first in first out ('FIFO') basis. The net realisable value of any item of stock is deemed to be nil if still held by the Foundation ten years after purchase.

h) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash at bank includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

i) Financial instruments

The Foundation only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

j) Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. Members consider that there is no expectation that income from Government and Lottery duty estimate will change, and the Contingency Reserve provides further assurance.

2 Taxation

No provision for Manx Income Tax is provided for in these financial statements as the entity is a registered charitable Foundation and not liable to Manx Income Tax.

3 Brian Kaneen Legacy

There were no further receipts during the year and the legacy income is now closed. In accordance with the wishes of the late Professor Brian Kaneen an annual bursary is provided for as Designated funds (see note 9b).

4 TCM and CN Frost Bequest

The TCM and CN Frost Bequest establishes the Sophia Morrison Award, which is linked to the highest grading student (under 18) in GCSE Manx each year. The award is made up of a cash prize and an engraved medal, and the student's school will be offered the Cair Vie trophy of a Viking longship to display for the year.

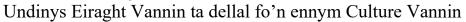

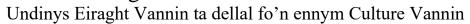

15 Transfers to Reserves

The Members approve all transfers to and from Reserves.

Contingency reserve – In 2022, the board increased the provision for operating costs and salaries to twelve months. During the current year the reserve was increased by £10,500 to £290,418, which is equivalent to ten months' costs. The intention is to add to the reserve further in future years as surpluses allow, until it reaches the target of twelve months' costs.

Sustainable buildings and conservation reserve - There are significant repairs required to the roof and to the rest of the Cultural Centre building which are currently being assessed through surveys. We are looking to secure a sustainable future for the building, too. Although no estimated costs or commitment to the work is in place, the best estimate of costs is in the region of £185,041. The reserve has been increased during the year by £35,041.

Grants reserve – Awarding grants is an important way of fulfilling our wide remit as a charity. The grants reserve allows for flexibility when exceptional applications are made. The reserve has been increased during the year by £15,862.
